Infants and toddlers need access to an environment that invites inquiry to support the development of STEM dispositions. In this session we will introduce and describe how adults can support this development when they provide inviting places, interesting materials, and ample time for investigation; recognize that infants and toddlers have their own learning agenda- they are "wired" for learning; trust the child to learn through their choices of materials and actions; and support rather than interfere with the child's agenda. Participants will learn strategies for engaging all infants and toddlers in developmentally appropriate play that supports the growth of STEM dispositions. Suggestions for using observation, documentation, and reflection to discover what young children are interested in investigating, the meaning of their actions, and the kinds of problems they create for themselves during their explorations will be included. Participants will have an opportunity to engage in teacher play with materials that have been vetted in supportive infant and toddler environments and to discuss the results of their play with other participants. Handouts will include information about easily accessed, safe, and intriguing materials that invite inquiry and support infants and toddlers in the development of STEM dispositions.
